



Norman Gilman Pennington

February 20, 1923 - July 2, 2012

Norman G. Pennington, age 89 of Onton, KY, formerly of Nortonville, died at 1:10 a.m. Monday, July 2, 2012 at Princeton Health and Rehabilitation Center in Princeton, KY. He was a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, a graduate of the Henderson Barber College, 60 year member of the N.H. Shaw Lodge in Nortonville, KY, an avid CB radio fan known as Headhunter. Mr. Pennington retired from being an underground coal miner after working at the Zigler #9 Mine and he also belonged to the United Mine Workers Association. He was a musician who played the fiddle and guitar and repaired stringed instruments as well as being a wood carver. He was preceded in death by his first wife Mary Rose Duke Pennington in 1984, one daughter Norma Rose Gamble in 1984, one brother Richard E. Pennington in 1949 and his step father Leonard Lester on 1970. His parents were Edward and Bessie Johnston Pennington. Survivors include his wife Emojean Fridy Pennington of Slaughters, KY, two sons Eddie (Penny) Pennington of Princeton, Larry (Kim) Pennington of Drakesboro, KY, two stepsons Dr. Charles Martin of Lexington, KY, Greg Fridy of Robards, KY, one step-daughter Kathy (Noble) Crowley of Onton, KY, one brother Wilford C. Lester of Nortonville, KY, one sister Dorothy Barnes of Atlanta, GA, five grandchildren, four great grandchildren, several step-grand and step-great grandchildren. Visitation will begin at 2:00 pm Thursday, July 5, 2012, at Onton United Methodist Church, Onton, KY followed by funeral services at 6:30 pm Thursday, with Rev. Marty Robertson and Alonzo Pennington officiating.
